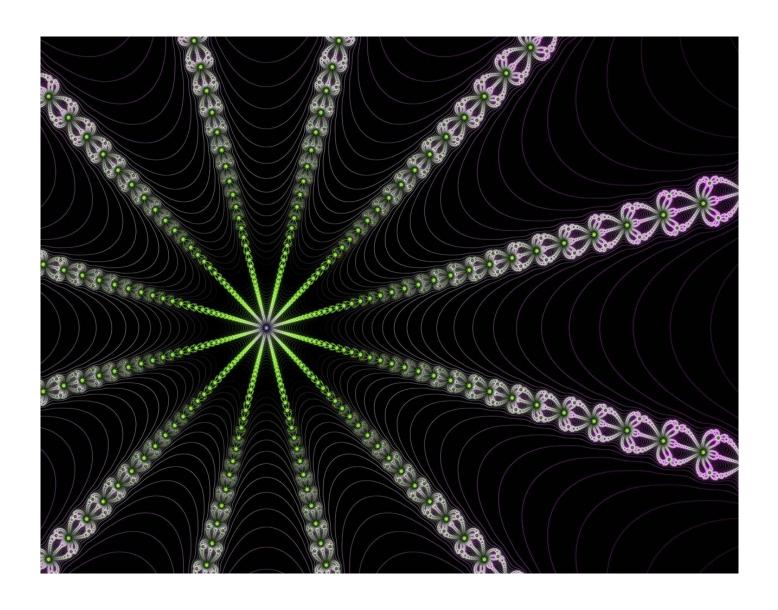

Executive Summary

In mid January 2011, an invitation to complete an online questionnaire on the state of volunteering was sent via e-mail to 8,000 ASRT members. At the close of the survey, a total of 1,180 had responded.

Since the primary purpose of this study was to analyze the results by generations, an equal random sampling was drawn across the defined generational range to ensure adequate representation. The primary cross-tabulation in this report is by the generational breakdown. The overall results listed in the tables were weighted to the population parameter to compensate for disproportional returns due to the equal random sampling across the defined generations.

Demographics

- The mean age was 68.3, 54.2, 39.7 and 25.1 for the silent generation (SG), baby boom generation (BB), generation X (X) and generation Y (Y), respectively.
- The majority of respondents in the BB, X and Y (77.2%, 74.8% and 52.0% respectively) are currently working full-time in the radio-logic sciences, with only 27.4% of the SG working full-time.
 - For those who are not working full-time 62.0% of the SG indicated that they have retired; 23.9% BB and 39.4% of X indicated working in a different area. About 49% of Y indicated that they were currently enrolled in an educational program.
- When asked what is the highest level of education completed, 44.1% of the SG indicated having a certificate, with the BB split with approximately 20% in each category of degree (certificate, associate, bachelor's and master's). The majority of X (63.5%) and Y (76.7%) have either an associate's degree or a bachelor's degree.
- The majority of all respondents primarily work in radiography and are employed as a staff technologist/therapist.

Volunteer Work

- The majority of respondents indicated that they are currently or have participated in volunteer work. With the BB having the highest percent of volunteers (77.0%) and the SG having the lowest percent of volunteers (65.4%).
- For those respondents <u>who have never participated in volunteer work</u>, the majority of all generations indicated that they were not aware of volunteer opportunities offered by the ASRT.
- For respondents who have participated in volunteer work, the majority of all generations indicated that they have not volunteered for the ASRT.
 - The BB indicated the highest level of participation with ASRT with 36.5% having volunteered.
 - For those who have volunteered for ASRT, approximately 32% currently are volunteering (SG: 12.5%, BB: 33.8%, X: 41.3% and Y: 12.5%).
- The majority of all generations indicated they do not know the typical roles and responsibilities of ASRT volunteers.
- When asked to state their level of agreement with statements about volunteering, respondents agreed that volunteering (mean response: scale -2=Strongly Disagree to 2=Strongly Agree):
 - Is meaningful for the profession (SG: 1.39, BB: 1.61, X: 1.44 and Y: 1.56).
 - Allows them to help others (SG: 1.53, BB: 1.62, X: 1.57 and Y: 1.63).
 - Brings them satisfaction (SG: 1.39, BB: 1.51, X: 1.44 and Y: 1.47).

Motivation/Engagement Questions

- Upon retirement, the SB and BB plan to stay active in the profession by keeping their ASRT membership (70.2% and 51.8% respectively), while the majority of X and Y have not made any plans for retirement (63.0% and 72.4% respectively).
- When asked what technology would be beneficial in motivating volunteers, SG (37.9%), X (58.9%) and Y (69.1%) selected "social media" most frequently. Whereas, BB most frequently selected "webinars" (42.9%).

Barriers to Volunteering

• The majority of all generations indicated that they were not aware of volunteer opportunities offered by the ASRT, with BB having the highest level of awareness (33.5%). In addition, the majority of all generation do not know where to find the list of ASRT volunteer opportunities.



- When asked if their radiologic sciences educator encouraged volunteering, the majority (after accounting for those who could not remember) of the SG, BB and X indicated no (84.7%, 64.5% and 67.3% respectively), whereas the majority of Y indicated yes (53.8%).
- The majority of all generations <u>do not believe</u> that the term "volunteering" has a negative connotation.
- When asked about time commitments of volunteering:
 - The SG and Y expect on average to spend 10 hours a month volunteering, while the BB and X expect on average to spend 8 hours a month.
 - The SG and Y have on average 8 hours a month to give to volunteering, while the BB on average has 6 hours and X has the least amount of time with 5 hours per month.
- When asked about their expectations when thinking about volunteering:
 - The SG expects to help others (80.5%), believes it will be a rewarding experience (70.3%), and expects to support causes they believe in (69.5%).
 - BB generation expects to support causes they believe in (76.6%), believes it will be a rewarding experience (76.3%), and expects to help others (75.9%).
 - X expects that volunteering will be a rewarding experience (77.6%), expects to support causes they believe in (73.7%) and help others (73.7%).
 - Y expects to help others (91.0%), expects to support causes they believe in (81.4%) and believes that volunteering will make a difference in someone's life (79.6%).

Volunteer Needs

- The majority of all generations believe ASRT is meeting their needs in presenting opportunities to volunteer.
- When asked about their needs for volunteering the BB, X and Y most often indicated they need flexibility (58.4%, 63.8% and 70.6% respectively). The SG most often indicated that they need to know what volunteer opportunities are available (58.8%).
- Y indicated that "friends" most often inspire them to volunteer, while the BB and X indicated that "leaders in the profession" inspire them to volunteer.
- Respondents were asked to specify what type of volunteer activity they would participate in if there were no limitations, responses were coded for common themes:
 - The SG and Y most often stated that they would do "anything to help the profession" (14.3% and 16.2% respectively).
 - The BB most often stated that they would like to participate in committees such as ethics, quality standards and by-laws (15.4%).
 - X most often stated that they would like to participate in a mentoring program (14.9%).
- Respondents were asked to complete this sentence: More people would start volunteering for the ASRT if:______. Responses were coded for common themes:
 - Respondents from all generation most often stated "if volunteer opportunities were known".

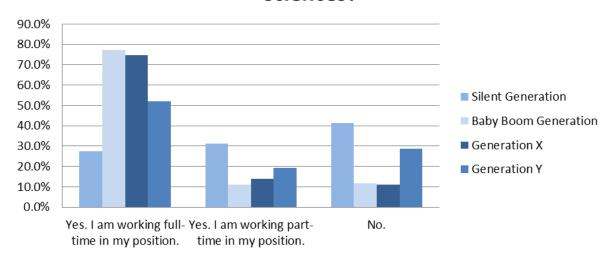

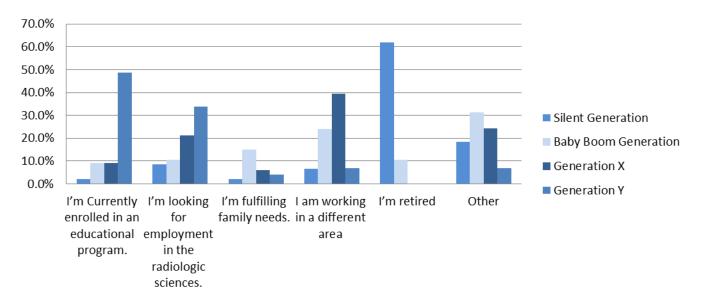

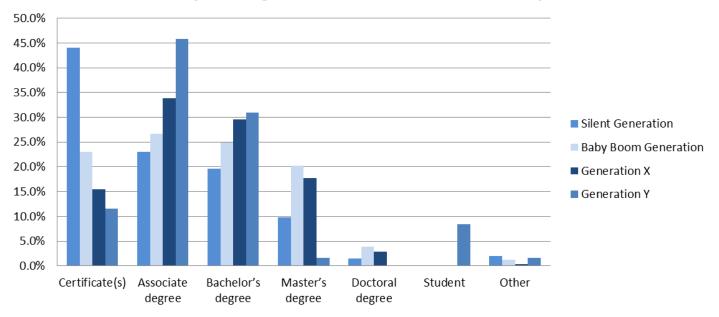

What is your highest level of education completed?

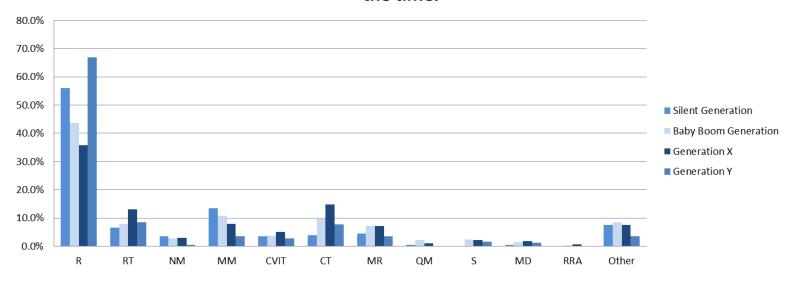

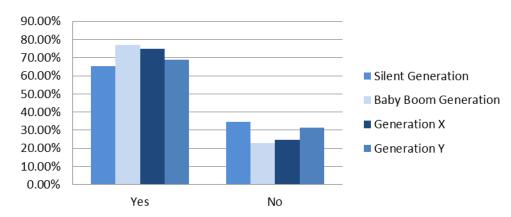

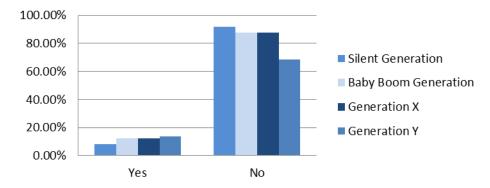

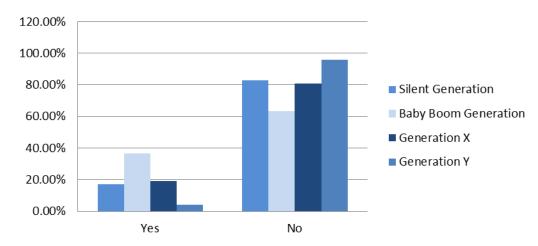

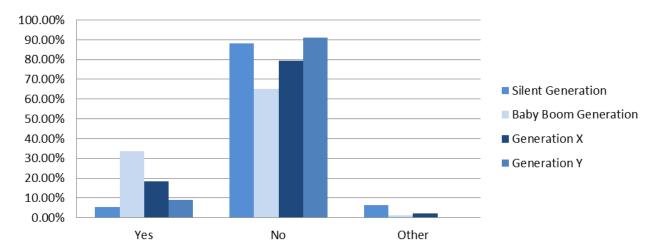

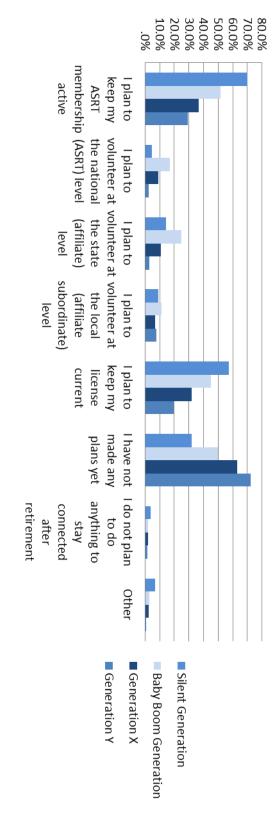

After retirement, how do you plan to stay connects to the profession?



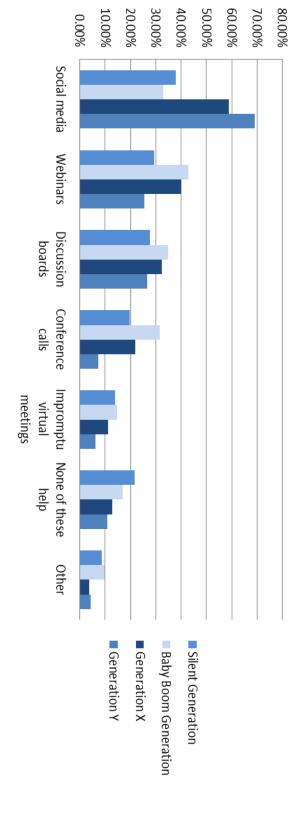

What type(s) of technology would be beneficial in motivating you to volunteer?





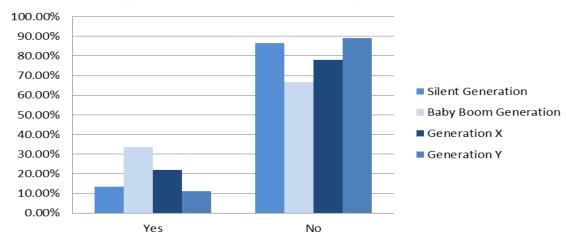

Are you aware of all the various volunteer opportunities offered by the ASRT?



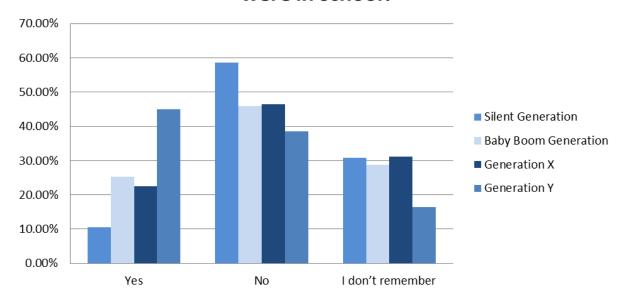

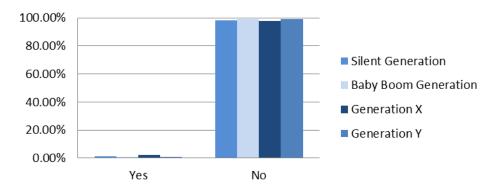
